9 Steps for Bible Exegesis and Exposition, Part 1: First ...

Exegesis is at the top; exposition is at the bottom. The exegete deals with Greek and Hebrew syntax, hermeneutics, theological arguments, and so forth. Exegesis (the high spigot) discovers the text's meaning. The pulpit is for teaching our congregations.

Structure. 3 John, like 2 John, is written in the standard epistolary format. Answer: Exegesis and eisegesis are two conflicting approaches in Bible study. Exegesis is the exposition or explanation of a text based on a careful, objective analysis. The word exegesis literally means "to lead out of." That means that the interpreter is led to his conclusions by following the text.
