The symbol (r) indicates that British pronunciation will have /r/ only if a vowel sound follows directly at the beginning of the next word, as in far away; otherwise the /r/ is omitted. For American English, all the /r/ sounds should be pronounced. /x/ represents a fricative sound as in /loʊx/ for Scottish loch, Irish lough.

GB English has 12 mouth positions for vowel sounds, here goes: /i ɪ e æ ə ɜ ʌ ɑ u ʊ ɔ ɒ/. It's really important to put the tongue in a different place for each of these, as many sounds are only subtly different - like the vowel sounds in SHIP and SHEEP.
