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Alpha thalassaemia - UKTS

Alpha thalassaemia occurs when some or all of the 4 genes that make hemoglobin (the alpha-globin genes) are missing or damaged. There are 4 types of alpha thalassaemia:
Alpha thalassaemia silent carrier. One gene is missing or damaged, and the other 3 are normal.

Alpha-thalassemia is a form of thalassemia involving the genes HBA1 and HBA2. Thalassemys are a group of inherited blood conditions which result in the impaired production of hemoglobin, the molecule that carries oxygen in the blood.

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Normal hemoglobin consists of two alpha chains and two beta chains; in alpha-thalassemia, there is a quantitative decrease in the amount of alpha chains, resulting in fewer normal hemoglobin molecules. Furthermore, alpha-thalassemia leads to the production of unsta

What is the pathophysiology of alpha(0) thalassemia?

If both partners are carriers, then there is a 1 in 4 chance of each pregnancy to produce a child with Alpha Zero thalassaemia major.

This is a very serious anaemia that develops in the unborn baby and it can only happen

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when both parents carry alpha zero thalassaemia.

Deletion of one alpha globin genes of one of the chromosome pairs produces the haemotologically silent carrier state - genotype - alpha/ alpha alpha.
