I MANAGEMENT OF POISONING AND DRUG OVERDOSE

Management of poisoning involves the assessment and treatment of airway compromise, ventilation impairment and haemodynamic instability. Thereafter, temperature disturbances should be treated, convulsions controlled, fluid, acid-base and electrolyte abnormalities corrected, and complications such as methaemoglobinaemia, rhabdomyolysis and serotonin syndrome diagnosed and managed optimally.

Resuscitation/Emergency Management Seizures - those due to poisoning are always generalized. Usually respond to benzodiazepines with barbiturates second... Quantitative toxicology screening is useful when knowledge of drug serum levels may affect patient management; examples include ingestions of acetaminophen, salicylates, ethanol, ethylene glycol,...

Oral Poisonings: Guidelines for Initial Evaluation and ...

Many drugs in overdose (e.g. opiates, tricyclics, benzodiazepines) can cause significant depression of cerebral and cardiorespiratory function. Emergency management should always start with a rapid initial assessment and resuscitation of the airway, breathing and circulation.

A person can be poisoned and not show symptoms for hours, days, or months. Cases of poisoning with a prolonged onset of symptoms are particularly dangerous because there may be a dangerous delay in obtaining medical attention. Acetaminophen is considered a safe drug, but is toxic to the liver when taken in large quantities. Because it acts so slowly, 7 to 12 hours may pass before the first symptoms begin (no appetite when normally hungry, nausea, and vomiting).
