Onomatopoeic words should not be confused with interjections, a part of speech, although onomatopoeic words may be used as interjection. Literal- is language that means exactly what it says. It is the opposite of figurative language. "The sky was raining on the poor children." Figurative- when you say one thing but mean another. "The sky wept for all the children"

Onomatopoeia. Onomatopoeia is the use of words that mimic sounds. Onomatopoeia is meant to reflect the actual sound of something, thereby giving the text a more realistic feeling. Examples: Bang! Pop! Sizzle Hiss Hyperbole. A hyperbole is an exaggerated statement meant to heighten effect and emphasize a point. Examples: My phone rang a million times.

Imagery means using figurative language in a way that appeals to our physical senses. Although the word "imagery" sounds like it refers only to visual language—the sense of sight—it actually refers to any of the five senses: sight, sound, smell, taste, and touch. Imagery can include descriptive language, onomatopoeia, personification, metaphor, simile, or any other figurative language that enhances the impact of the poem by appealing to our bodily senses.
